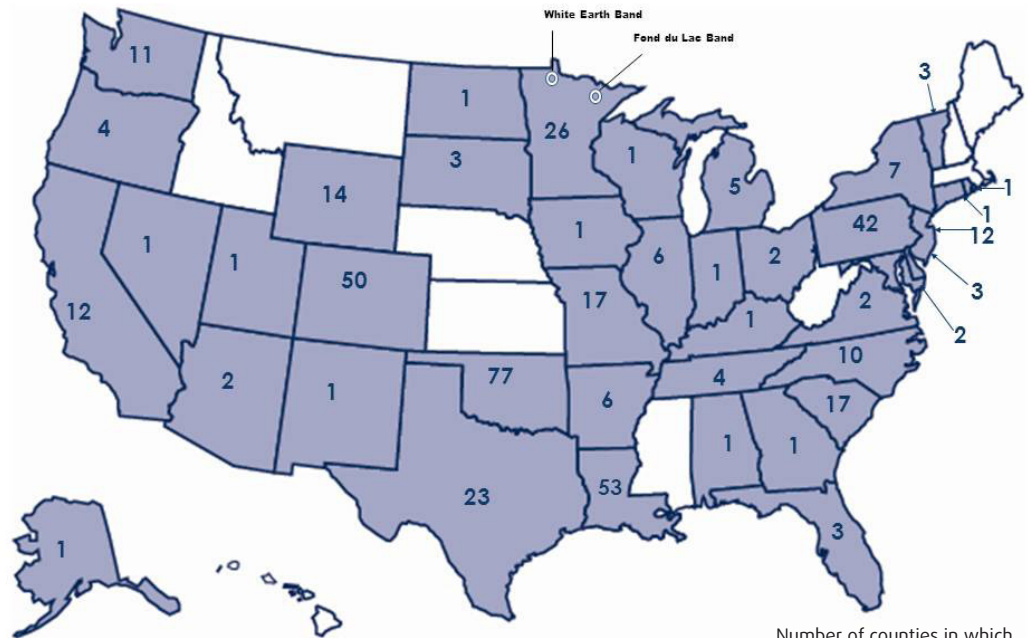


## NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP SNAPSHOT

Nurse-Family Partnership® (NFP) is an evidence-based, community health program that helps transform the lives of vulnerable mothers pregnant with their first child. Each mother NFP serves is partnered with a registered nurse early in her pregnancy and receives ongoing nurse home visits that continue through her child's second birthday. Independent research shows that communities can benefit from this relationship – every dollar invested in Nurse-Family Partnership can yield up to five dollars in return.

**Public-Private Partnerships**

**Funding:** Nurse-Family Partnership is funded by a range of private and public funding sources, including Medicaid, Maternal and Child Health Services Block Grant (Title V), juvenile justice funds, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Child Care Development, Social Services Block Grants and the federal Maternal, Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program, in addition to state and local general funds.

**Program Cost:** Nurse-Family Partnership typically costs \$4,500 per family per year with a range throughout the country of \$2,914 - \$6,463 per family per year.

**Implementing Agencies:** The Nurse-Family Partnership National Service Office contracts with and provides support to states and agencies that deliver the Nurse-Family Partnership program. These agencies are public and nonprofit entities, including state and county public health departments, community-based health centers, nursing associations and hospitals.
