Proven Results

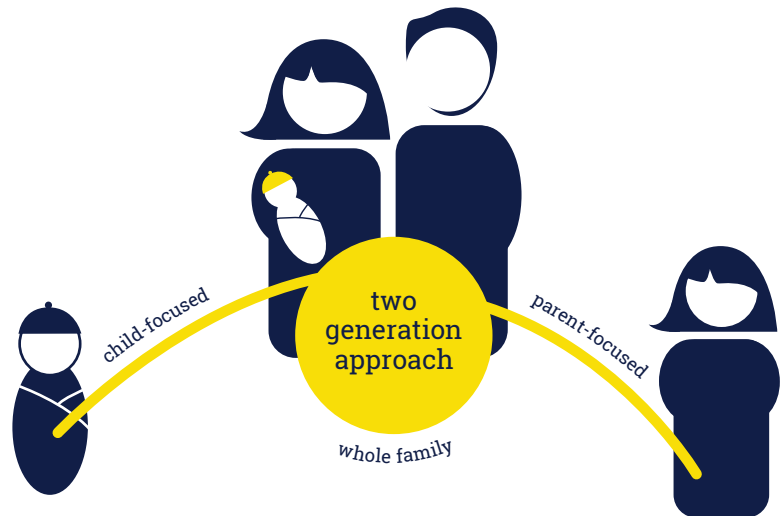
